# **Project:** Using digital technologies to maintain the social engagement of older adults living independently: experiences from COVID-19

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# Introduction

Thank you for your interest in participating in this research project. The following pages will provide you with further information about the project, so that you can decide if you would like to take part in this research.

Please take the time to read this information carefully. You may ask questions about anything you don't understand or want to know more about.

Your participation is voluntary. If you don't wish to take part, you don't have to. If you begin participating, you can also stop at any time.

#### What is this research about?

This study aims to investigate how older adults have been using technologies to maintain social engagement, especially during COVID-19 lockdowns, and to understand their experiences and perceptions of maintaining social engagement through digital tools.

# What will I be asked to do?

If you choose to participate, you will be asked to take part in an interview with one of the researchers. The researcher will ask questions about how the COVID-19 pandemic affected your social life, your experiences of using technologies to maintain social engagement, and what factors affected your experiences. You will be also asked to share photos to illustrate your use of technology if needed. Before the interview, you will be asked to fill out a short questionnaire collecting information such as age, living status and experience of technologies. The interview and questionnaire together will take about 1 hour.

# What are the possible benefits?

You will have the opportunity to share your thoughts about your experiences in using digital technologies to maintain the social engagement of older adults living independently. By doing this, you will be helping researchers to gain a better understanding of what needs to be considered in the design of digital systems or programs for older people living independently. You will receive a \$20 gift card at the end of the interview as a thank you for your participation.

#### What are the possible risks?

There are minimal risks associated with participation. It is possible that you may feel uncomfortable or unsure of how to answer a question. If this is the case, please let the

researcher know, and the interview can be paused or stopped. There are no right or wrong answers to the questions, and your answers are not being judged. All information related to your identity (including names and photos with faces) will be de-identified by using pseudonyms and obfuscation in any reports and publications based on the finding of the research.

#### Do I have to take part?

No. Participation is completely voluntary. You can withdraw (quit) at any time. You can also ask us to destroy any data that has been collected prior to you withdrawing from the study if you wish.

#### What will happen to information about me?

The data will be retained for five years after the last date of publication. The data will then be destroyed under university regulations.
